Garden bed 18: Wedding Lawn Garden bed. This is very large centrepiece Garden bed facing the rear entrance to the south and the Wedding Lawn to the north. In addition to camellias, it features a range of outstanding trees and shrubs including a second swamp cypress (Taxodium distichum); an outstanding Mexican Bald Cypress (Taxodium mucronatum, encountered immediately upon entry through the main rear gate), a Persian Witch Hazel (Parrotia persica); a Golden Totara (Podocarpus totara 'Aureus'); Magnolia doltsopa 'Silver Cloud'; and a Golden English Elm (Ulmus procera 'Louis van Houtte').
